Missionary Medicine Intensive (MMI) Instructors



Lowell Miller, APRN, has been a volunteer instructor for MMI for five years. He lives in Johnson City, TN, and contracts with Tusculum University in Greenville, TN, as a clinical instructor. He also volunteers with Crossroads Medical Mission in Bristol, VA, to serve the underprivileged in the Appalachian area. He has served on several short-term medical mission trips to Haiti and will soon take some students to Belize as part of Tusculum's first attempt of a nursing study abroad program.
